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History brought alive musically at Underground Railroad site

A dramatic episode in Philadelphia history brought to life through music and performed in Philadelphia's only intact, accessible stop on the Underground Railroad

Philadelphia, PA February 7, 2013 – Imagine the fear that gripped the inhabitants of the Johnson House when federal marshals came looking for escaped slaves travelling along the Underground Railroad. On Sunday, February 24, 2013, the public will experience the powerful story of just such a moment in history. **Commonwealth Youthchoirs** will host three performances of *The Good Raised Up: A Story of Community, Integrity, and the Road to Freedom*. The choral work will be performed by young singers from Keystone State Boychoir, Pennsylvania Girlchoir and *Find Your Instrument!* Choir. The performances, at 2:00, 2:45, and 3:30 pm, are made possible by support from **PNC Arts Alive**, and admission is free. Johnson House is located at 6303 Germantown Avenue, Philadelphia.

The Good Raised Up, commissioned by Commonwealth Youthchoirs and created by two acclaimed Philadelphia artists, storyteller Charlotte Blake Alston and jazz violinist John Blake, Jr., is an original "sung story" premiered by the choirs at Johnson House in 2012. The Good Raised Up is a dramatic composition for treble chorus, violin, percussion, piano and several narrators, and recounts a night in the 1850s when a Quaker family in Germantown protected a group of escaped slaves from capture by a band of federal marshals.

The commission offered these talented siblings a rare chance to work together. **John Blake, Jr**. has been one of the world's leading jazz violinists for over four decades. He has received numerous awards and prizes and is also an accomplished composer, arranger, author, teacher and lecturer. **Charlotte Blake Alston** is a nationally renowned storyteller, narrator, instrumentalist and singer who performs in venues throughout North America and abroad.

In writing the libretto, Alston said, "The first challenge was documenting the authenticity of the story, as it was passed down orally." An interesting discovery, she adds, "was that Quakers who participated in hiding runaways had to consider that not being truthful to federal marshals or slave catchers seeking runaways was against the very tenets of Quakerism. In claiming 'There are no slaves here,' they stood by their belief - there are PEOPLE here, but no slaves." In creating the music to complement his sister's text, composer Blake joined the power of jazz composition with the medium of children's choral music in giving voice to this moment in history.

"When we first heard the story of what happened that night at the Johnson House, it caught our imagination. We knew we had to find a way to bring it to life musically," said **Susan Ashbaker**, **Executive Director of Commonwealth Youthchoirs**. As plans for the commission and the accompanying festival took shape, Commonwealth Youthchoirs was awarded a generous grant from PNC Arts Alive to make the festival possible.

PNC Arts Alive is a five-year, \$5 million investment from The PNC Foundation that supports visual and performing arts groups with the goal of increasing arts access and engagement.
